

A tour de force of acting, Manoj Bajpayee is a name known to every single audience across the country. Considered as one of the finest actors to work in


Hindi film industry, Manoj vajelitwo Asia Pacific Screen Awards, and coveted incomplete versatile acting in more than 70 films.

Since then Manoj has never looked back and delivered stellar performances in films like—*Zubeidaa (2001)*, *Pinjaar (2003)*, *Rajneeti (2010)*, *Gangs of Wasseypure Part 1 and 2 (2012)*, *Aligarh (2016)* and many others.

Shai Goldman Cinematography Workshop

It is said that Camera is a pen for the screen. Captivating images, moving portrayals of humans create a magic on screen. Good camera can evoke emotions and create unforgettable visual memories. The Director of Photography is instrumental in crafting written words on the big screen.

. We are privileged to have a magician, Mr. Shai Goldman, conducting his session on creating magic through camera.

Mr. Goldman is a multiple award winning cinematographer whose films are regular presence at prestigious film festivals. Winner of the Ophir Cinematography Prize 2006, 2016, and 2019 for his work in the film Synonyms, directed by Nadav Lapid, which won prestigious Golden Bear at Berlinale.

His best-known and most successful film as a Cinematographer was *The Band's Visit (2007)*, directed by Eran Kolirin. Goldman brought the successful film, an abstract visual quality that allowed the work to deviate from the local and touch the universal, and therefore contribute to the film's considerable international success.
