## **Anupam Kher**

Her ability to portray characters with warmth and authenticity endeared her to audiences. Khote often starred alongside stalwarts like Mehmood, forming a memorable comedic duo. Her performances were rooted in naturalistic acting, a rare quality in an era that leaned toward melodrama.
